


#### The State Collected and Borrowed \$88.5 Billion




#### The State Spent \$93.2 Billion



#### The State Spent \$40.3 Billion from the Federal Government




#### The State Spent \$33.9 Billion in Total Federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act Funds




#### Total Spending from State Resources


Since 2008, spending from State resources increased 10.2%. Inflation-adjusted spending increased 8.2% over the same period.

# Total State Spending from State Resources per Person





Spending for Education and Public Health accounts for 63.7% of total spending from State resources.


## Taxes per \$1,000 of Personal Income



Local taxes in New York are 66.7% above the national average, while State taxes are 17.2% above the national average.


#### **Education Funding Sources**


#### State-Funded Debt



State-funded debt increased 71.5% since 2002. Non-voter approved capital debt accounted for 81.0% of the State-funded debt outstanding in 2011-12.


#### The Cost of New York State's Debt

figures in billions




Debt service costs have increased 68.3% since 2002.

In 2011, New York's debt per capita was nearly three times the national median.


#### Debt as a Percentage of Personal Income




New York has more than twice as much debt as a percentage of personal income than the national median.

(comparison of 2007 and 2012)




## Personal Income per Person, N.Y. vs. U.S.




Since 2007, personal income has grown slower in New York (6.5%) than in the nation as a whole (8.0%).

## Highway Condition Ratings in New York


as a percentage of total lane miles
